# College and Career Readiness Checklist



## Senior Year

### September

- ☐ Make or update your post-high school plan.
  - ☐ Make a list of 3 careers you are interested in and the training or education (including program and major) you will need.
  - ☐ Figure out the right fit; think about the most important criteria in choosing a college.
  - ☐ Make a list of 5 colleges you are interested in with deadline information.
- ☐ Stay on track.
  - ☐ Fill in the PVHS College Bound Course Checklist to make sure that you have the classes you need to graduate and apply to college.
- ☐ Clean up your online act.
  - ☐ Create a professional e-mail if you haven't already.
  - ☐ Set privacy settings on social media accounts.
- ☐ Explore how to pay for college.
  - ☐ Explore Financial Aid and Scholarships and make a list of deadline information.
  - ☐ Create a Federal Student Aid (FSA) ID in order to be able to apply to FAFSA when it opens October 1st.
  - ☐ Gather all of the information you will need to apply for federal financial aid.
  - ☐ Sign up for a raise.me account if you haven't done so already.
- ☐ Sign up for the SAT or ACT.
  - ☐ Sign up for the ACT or SAT if you haven't taken it or want to re-take it.
- ☐ Look out for special circumstances.
  - ☐ If you are interested in the arts, military, or playing sports in college, make sure you know deadlines and requirements for the programs.

### October

- ☐ Document accomplishments.
  - ☐ Make a list of all of the activities and awards you have received.
  - ☐ Make a sample resume.
- ☐ Tell your story.
  - ☐ Practice writing college and scholarship essays; write a personal statement about who you are and your unique qualities.
- ☐ Narrow the field.
  - ☐ Narrow your list of colleges. (2 Reach Schools, 2 Good Match Schools, at least 1 Fall back school)
  - ☐ Visit colleges and attend college fairs.
- ☐ Complete the FAFSA.
  - ☐ Attend Financial Aid Event at PVHS (October 18th @ 4:30 PM)
  - ☐ Fill out and submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid to be eligible for federal grants, loans and work-study funds. You will probably need information from your family including tax returns. Be sure to enter the names of any college you might apply to.
- ☐ Request Letters of Recommendation.
  - ☐ Think carefully about who you want to ask for letters of recommendation. Most likely you will need a letter from 2 teachers as well as one from your counselor. Do not choose 2 teachers from within the same field.
  - ☐ Request letters of recommendation through Naviance. Make sure to also fill out the Letter of Recommendation Form which provides the teacher/counselor with

necessary information. The form can be found on Naviance by clicking the Document Resources Tab located on the bottom of the Naviance Home Page.

- ☐ Take or Re-take the SAT or ACT.
  - ☐ Review practice tests
  - ☐ Link SAT results to Khan Academy and use practice features.
  - ☐ Download Daily Practice for the SAT App on your phone and use it daily.
  - ☐ Practice for the ACT by signing up for the free ACT Academy resource.
  - ☐ Borrow a SAT/ACT Practice Book from the College and Career Center.
  - ☐ Take or re-take the ACT or SAT.

#### November

- ☐ Finalize the list.
  - ☐ Finalize your list of colleges (2 Reach Schools, 2 Good Match Schools, at least 1 Fall Back School)
  - ☐ Continue visiting colleges and college fairs.
  - ☐ Add all of the schools where you plan to apply to the FAFSA.
- ☐ Be Prepared!
  - ☐ Check on deadlines and gather all of the information you will need to apply to colleges.
- ☐ APPLY!
  - ☐ You may qualify for a fee deferral or waiver so you won't have to pay the application fee - ask your counselor if you think you may qualify.
  - ☐ Complete the FAFSA if you haven't done so already, as well as other financial aid and scholarship applications.
- ☐ Follow up.
  - ☐ Make sure that your high school transcript, test scores, letters of recommendation, and other supplemental materials are sent to colleges.
  - ☐ Check your e-mail regularly (This will be the main way that colleges contact you).

#### December

- ☐ Finish applying to colleges.
  - ☐ Fill out and submit any lingering applications for college, job training, or other post-high school plans.
- ☐ Talk to current college students.
  - ☐ Connect with alumni from your high school who may be home on break or reach out to college students on social media.
- ☐ Get set for scholarships.
  - ☐ Look for new scholarship announcements in the College and Career Newsletter.
  - ☐ Update you list of scholarships you plan to apply to.
  - ☐ Search for scholarship applications in Naviance.
  - ☐ Update your raise.me account.
- ☐ Catch up on details.
  - ☐ Use the winter break to catch up on any tasks you haven't yet completed for college applications and financial aid.

#### January/February/March

- ☐ Keep up the good work.
  - ☐ Colleges (and scholarship applications) look at second semester grades - so no slacking.
  - ☐ Stay involved with extracurriculars and take advantage of internships, job shadowing experiences, or other hands-on learning opportunities.
- ☐ Confirm FAFSA information.
  - ☐ The Student Aid Report (SAR) is a summary of what you filled out on the FAFSA. Make sure that all of the information is correct and make any changes.

## IMPORTANT COLLEGE APPLICATION TERMS

- **Apply Direct to Institution** – The application found online at the college or university's website.
- **Coalition For Access, Affordability and Success Application (Coalition App)**- A standard application that is accepted by 90 colleges and universities. Some schools will accept the Coalition App in addition to current applications, while other schools will require all students to use the Coalition App (ex. UF).
- **Common Application (Common App)**- A standard application that is accepted by about 500 colleges in lieu of their own application. This type of application must be linked to your Naviance account.
- **Early Action** – Early Action is NOT binding. You will just be notified at an earlier date. Admissions based merit scholarships are often given out to these applicants. Note that there are two types of Early Action applications (restrictive and non-restrictive). Early Action Restrictive (or Single Choice) allows you to apply to one school early action, but is not binding. The one caveat is that you may apply to other PUBLIC universities, but not other private universities. Early Action Non-restrictive means that you can apply to as many schools (public or private) as you would like. Note that your transcript should be strong Freshman-Junior years, if you apply Early Action. If you are waiting to bump up your GPA senior year, then you may want to apply regular decision.
- **Early Decision** – If you are admitted under an Early Decision program, you MUST withdraw all other college applications. This is a binding decision. You should only apply Early Decision, if that college is truly your first choice school. Be sure to research the financial aid opportunities available to you BEFORE you apply!
- **Regular Decision** – This is a regular application and you will be notified at the same time most other applicants are notified.
- **Rolling Admission** – Applications are evaluated and acted upon as they are completed. You can usually expect to find out 6-8 weeks after application. However, once the college has filled its seats for that class, the admissions window is closed.
- **Single-Choice Early Action** – This is similar to Early Action, but you can only apply to one school (with a few exceptions). However, if accepted, it is not binding. Harvard and Yale both use SCEA. If you feel that your junior year credentials are strong enough to be considered at these institutions, then SCEA may be for you. If you need your senior year grades to improve your GPA, then wait to apply under the Regular Decision deadline.
- **2+2 Articulation Agreement** – The state of Florida guarantees that students who complete an AA degree at a Florida community college have the opportunity to earn a bachelor's degree at a state

university or Florida college offering four-year degrees. However, students are not guaranteed transfer into the college or university of their choice.

### **IMPORTANT FINANCIAL AID TERMS**

- **FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)** – If you plan to apply for need-based scholarships or work study, you will need to complete this online application. Some scholarship applications also require it.
- **Admissions-based Merit Scholarships** – There is generally no additional application required. These are only based on your grades, test scores, and admissions application. The college does not look at your family's financial situation. The admissions department will determine what you qualify for and send you a letter with your admissions decision, or later in the Spring. YOU must verify if you need additional paperwork to apply for admission-based merit scholarships.
- **CSS/Financial Aid Profile**- A financial aid form produced by College Board that is required for students seeking aid at approximately 10% of the nation's colleges and universities (including most highly selective institutions). Check colleges' websites for requirement information. Available at: [www.collegeboard.org](http://www.collegeboard.org).
- **Expected Family Contribution (EFC)**– The amount determined by the government, after completing your FAFSA, that your family can reasonably afford to pay for you to attend one year of college including all expenses.
- **Grant** – financial aid that does not need to be repaid, unless you withdraw from school and will then owe a refund. Many grants are based on financial need, however, some grants also take into consideration academic performance, academic degree program and/or residence status.
- **Loans** – borrowed money for college or career school; you must repay your loans, with interest.
- **Need-based aid and scholarships** – Scholarships given to you to off set the difference between what a year of college will cost you and your EFC (Expected Family Contribution).
- **Student Aid Report (SAR)**-A form sent to families in response to submission of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) that includes the Expected Family Contribution (EFC).
- **Work-Study** – a federal work program through which you earn money to help you pay for school that will not count against your next year's Expected Family Contribution.

## IMPORTANT COLLEGE ADMISSIONS TERMS

- **Deferred Admission-** The practice of some colleges allowing an accepted student to postpone enrollment for one year.
- **Deferred Decision-** The practice of some colleges of holding an applicant's record for review again with the next applicant pool. A student who is deferred is neither accepted nor rejected. Most schools require first semester senior year transcripts in the 2<sup>nd</sup> evaluation.
- **Need Blind Admissions-** The term that applies to colleges that make decisions without regard to the financial circumstances of the applicants. Colleges with need-blind admissions do not necessarily offer aid to meet the full need of all accepted applicants.
- **Open Admissions-** The policy of some colleges admitting virtually all high school graduates regardless of academic qualifications such as high school grades and admission test scores. Often times only a high school diploma is required. (Community colleges general fall under an open admissions classification.)

## DEFINITIONS OF ADMISSION OPTIONS IN HIGHER EDUCATION



### STUDENTS: WHICH COLLEGE ADMISSION PROCESS BEST SUITS YOU?

#### Non-Restrictive Application Plans

##### Regular Decision

###### DEFINITION:

Students submit an application by a specified date and receive a decision in a clearly stated period of time.

###### COMMITMENT:

NON-BINDING

##### Rolling Admission

###### DEFINITION:

Institutions review applications as they are submitted and render admission decisions throughout the admission cycle.

###### COMMITMENT:

NON-BINDING

##### Early Action (EA)

###### DEFINITION:

Students apply early and receive a decision well in advance of the institution's regular response date.

###### COMMITMENT:

NON-BINDING

#### Restrictive Application Plans

##### Early Decision (ED)

###### DEFINITION:

Students make a commitment to a first-choice institution where, if admitted they definitely will enroll. The application deadline and decision deadline occur early.

###### COMMITMENT:

BINDING

##### Restrictive Early Action (REA)

###### DEFINITION:

Students apply to an institution of preference and receive a decision early. They may be restricted from applying ED or EA or REA to other institutions. If offered enrollment, they have until May 1 to confirm.

###### COMMITMENT:

NON-BINDING

Students are not restricted from applying to other institutions and have until May 1 to consider their options and confirm enrollment.

Students are responsible for determining and following restrictions.

#### **Initial Eligibility Requirements:** (As determined by the Department of Education.)

1. Submit the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) by August 31 of senior year of high school,
2. Complete the 16 college-preparatory courses required for admission to a state university,
3. Achieve the required weighted GPA in the 16 college-preparatory courses per chart below,
4. Complete the required number of service hours per chart below, and
5. Achieve the required combined SAT<sup>®</sup> or composite ACT<sup>®</sup> score per chart below.

#### **Requirements to Receive an Award:** (As determined by your postsecondary institution.)

1. Evaluated by Office of Student Financial Assistance (OSFA) as meeting the initial eligibility requirements,
2. Graduated with a standard high school diploma or its equivalent,
3. Be a Florida resident and U.S. citizen or eligible noncitizen, and
4. Enroll as a degree- or certificate-seeking student at a Florida institution in at least 6 non-remedial semester credit hours.

*Note: If not funded the year after graduating from high school, student must apply within 2 years of graduating from high school to have the award reinstated.*

#### **Renewal Requirements:** (As determined by grade and hours submitted by your postsecondary institution.)

1. Students must earn the number of credit hours based on the student's enrollment type per term, and
2. The renewal cumulative GPA requirements are outlined in the table below.

These eligibility requirements are subject to change with each legislative session.

The student is responsible for tracking application and award status online, and ensuring that funding for an academic year is accurate by contacting their institution's financial aid office.

## Award Amounts

**Florida Academic Scholars (FAS)** will receive an award to cover 100% of tuition and applicable fees and \$300 for both fall and spring semesters for additional educational expenses. Students attending a public institution will have tuition and applicable fees covered. Students attending a nonpublic institution will receive a comparable amount as noted in the Private Award Chart. FAS students can receive an award during the summer sessions to cover tuition and applicable fees, beginning with the 2018 summer term.

**Florida Medallion Scholars (FMS)** will receive an award to cover 75% of tuition and applicable fees. Students attending a public institution will have tuition and applicable fees covered. Students attending a nonpublic institution will receive a comparable amount as noted in the Private Award Chart. FMS students can receive an award during the summer sessions to cover tuition and applicable fees, beginning with the 2019 summer term.

The applicable fees for both FAS and FMS include activity and service fee, health fee, athletic fee, financial aid fee, capital improvement fee, campus access/transportation fee, technology fee and tuition differential fee.

Other award recipients will receive a fixed cost per credit hour based on award level, institution type, and credit type as outlined in the table below.

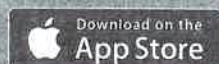

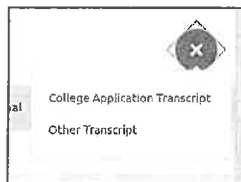
