

# ENC 1102 Composition II Writing and Rhetoric (21025, 21026, & 21028)

# Course Description:

ENC 1102 is an advanced composition course with an emphasis placed on critical thinking skills, conducting academic research, and research-based writing using MLA documentation. Students will practice proper and correct in-text citations, will compile a Works Cited, and will demonstrate synthesis and seamless integration of sources into their writing, with a strong emphasis on understanding and avoiding plagiarism. Students will be trained in the identification and searching of major databases found in SJR STATE electronic resources and will write several documented papers. Students will make an oral presentation. Course content may focus on the main styles of argumentation undertaken as a foundation for writing about and with primary and secondary sources. An exit grade of "C" or higher is required. ENC 1102 is a Gordon Rule writing course as defined by SBE Rule 6A-10.030. Prerequisite: ENC 1101 with a grade of "C" or higher.

ENC 1102: Writing and Rhetoric fulfills 3 of the 9 credit hours required in English.

# Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successfully completing this course, students shall be able to:

- A. Engage in original ("independent") thought and inquiry through the research process.
- B. Plan and execute the research process from ideas and thesis statement to writing and documentation through rigorous critical analysis; identify purpose and audience; understand the sequential process of research and writing (invention, exploring, drafting, revision, and editing).
- C. Learn and/or develop effective processes for analyzing and writing argumentative and persuasive essays.
- D. Find, evaluate, analyze, and synthesize appropriate primary and secondary sources, which includes distinguishing scholarly from popular sources; primary from secondary sources; and reputable from disreputable sources.
- E. Integrate bibliographic sources into original writing in a seamless and organized manner.
- F. Continue to master the mechanics of writing, including grammar, syntax, punctuation, and spelling.
- G. Learn how to write in a voice that is appropriate for chosen audience and the purpose of the paper
- H. Construct several documented essays and conduct research
- I. Organize and deliver a short oral presentation.

## Assessment:

# **Writing Activities:**

There are four formal writing activities throughout the course: 1) Children's Book Magazine Article; 2) Wikipedia Memo; 3) Meme Essay; 4) Notorious Expose. For each essay, I will provide an assignment sheet and lectures/activities to get started. I will also be available during your particular class as well as in the morning "office hours." Rough drafts need to be formatted properly and be at least the minimum length to proceed to the Peer Review activity. Final drafts must be accompanied by the rough draft and must be free of markings, different from the previous draft(s), and submitted in an envelope as well as to Turnitin.com, unless otherwise stated. Essay packets submitted without a rough (or even a final) draft will be considered not fulfilling the writing requirement and will

receive a reduced grade. Doing this more than once will most likely result in an unsuccessful completion of the class. Due dates are firm.

### Presentations:

Then for the Notorious Project you will have to do a presentation on your selected person to the class and create a wanted poster. The oral presentation rubric will be provided early on to encourage practice with some of the components throughout the semester. *Presentation due dates may vary due to time constraints*.

### Classwork/Homework:

This includes various worksheets, activities, and quizzes related to the various chapters and readings from the *Everything's an Argument*. This may also include pop quizzes. In addition, vocabulary activities and quizzes based on words from myvocabulary.com will be used.

**Memory Book:** See the assignment sheet for specific instructions. It will act as a portfolio assessment of sorts in the place of an actual final exam.
