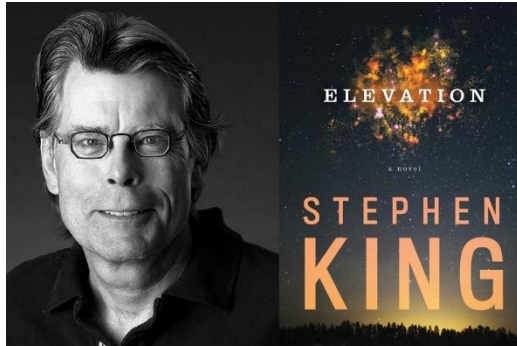


English IV Standard Summer Reading-

ASSIGNMENT: (on a single sheet of paper—front side only)

1. Draw a map of Castle Rock, the setting of the story.
2. On the map, be sure to include the name of each location and who lives or works there. Be as specific as possible. You must have a minimum of FOUR locations on the map.

The more information that you can put on the map the more helpful you will find it when it comes to reviewing the novel. You may make it as creative and colorful as you wish. Reading activities will occur the first week of class and this information will come in handy to refresh your mind for them.

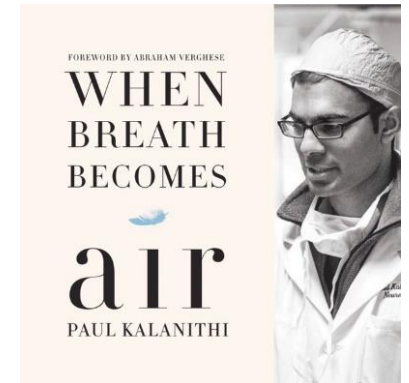
The map will be due on the FIRST day of class.

English IV Honors Summer Reading-

The summer reading is a Pulitzer Prize Finalist and a *New York Times* bestseller. Reading it will prepare you for the type of thought provoking and critical thinking activities in English IV Honors. The related assignment is as much about following directions as it is about completing the reading. Read the instructions below carefully.

When Breath Becomes Air

ASSIGNMENT: (on a single sheet of paper—may use both sides)

1. Create a timeline of events from the author's life. Your timeline must contain at least FIVE events from *Part I: In Perfect Health I Begins* and at least FIVE events from *Part II: Cease not until Death*.
2. For each event (minimum of ten) on the timeline, include a relevant quote with the corresponding page number from the book in parentheses after it.
3. For at least FIVE of your ten events, include a small (about the size of a quarter) visual or symbol. For example, the author recalls a childhood event involving a rattlesnake. If you chose to put this on your timeline, you would include the event, a related quote (with page number), and small image of a snake.
4. Your timeline may be typed or handwritten.

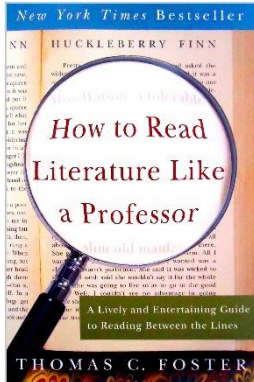
The timeline will be used as a springboard for discussing and writing about the novel. Needless to say, your timeline should NOT look exactly like anyone else's timeline.

The timeline will be due on the FIRST day of class.

AP LIT Required Summer Reading:

1. *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* by Mark Twain
2. Chapters 1, 5, 12, and 19 only of *How to Read Literature Like a Professor* by Thomas Foster ***Students MUST purchase this text to use as a reference throughout the course.



Assignment:

For Foster's book, students must read:

- Chapter 1 "Every Trip is a Quest"
- Chapter 5 "Now Where Have I Seen Her Before?"
- Chapter 12 "Is that a Symbol?"
- Chapter 19 "Geography Matters"

Use Foster's chapters to analyze the novel as you read. These chapters allude directly to Twain's work.

ANNOTATION: While reading *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn*, students must annotate by marking, highlighting, and/or using post-its in the text. Annotations should be present in every chapter.

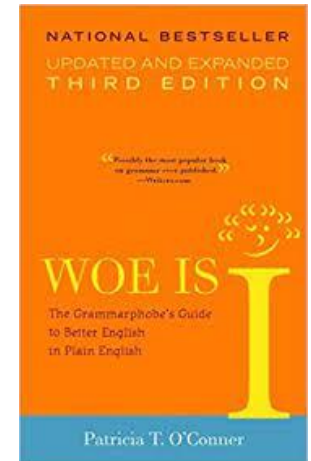
- *Crime and Punishment* by Fyodor Dostoevsky

ASSIGNMENT: (on a single sheet of paper)

1. Write down each chapter's title name.
2. Summarize the grammar rules explained in the chapter as well as list examples when helpful.

There are ten to twelve chapters in the book depending upon which edition you use. Either edition is fine; the information is essentially the same. You will take a grammar pre-test the first week of class and this information will come in handy for it.

The one-page notes will be due on the FIRST day of class.
